# Snakes slither into limelight

CROWDS flocked to Centro Shopping Centre last week for some slippery, scaly snake action

The owner of Snakebusters, Raymond Hoser, led the snake shows and said hundreds of people attended throughout the week.

Children had the opportunity to handle non-venomous snakes and reptiles and get up close and personal with some of Australia's deadliest during the shows, which ran for six days at the Cranbourne shopping centre.

"It was a hugely popular week. Kids can actually hold snakes and meet and greet the animals," Mr Hoser said.

Lyndhurst resident Pauline, 54, brought her daughter to one of the shows for the first time last year, and said it was great to watch the kids enjoy themselves and pay attention.

"It's the best show I've seen as far as information and education," she said.

"It's a credit to the performer. Children are having fun but being educated at the same time and it's free, which is fantastic."

Mr Hoser said some children conquered their fears of snakes during his shows.

"It's always great to see children get over their fears. But we actually tell people during our shows that it's good to be afraid of snakes in the real world. They don't run around trying to kill you, they are quite casual animals most of the time, but our shows offer people the opportunity to hold non-venomous snakes."



#### Snakes the showstopper

CONGRATULATIONS again to the people of Pakenham for another wonderful agricultural show last weekend.

My wife and children enjoyed the displays in weath-

er only God himself could have ordered.

For us the showstopper was the snake show by snakebuster Raymond Hoser.

Never before have I seen such an informative demonstration of our local venomous snakes and had such a good chance to eyeball them at close quarters.

It wasn't the old fashioned style 'This snake is mean and will kill you', snake out of bag and back in seconds later.

Hoser brought the snakes out of the box and by the end of the talk, all were sitting together on a table so you could see the different kinds next to one another for a comparative look like I'd never seen before.

Blacks, browns, tigers, copperheads, death adders, the lot!

Based on the pleasant way the snakes were behaving I realised that snakes are far from evil, but only attack when in fear of their life.

They obviously didn't fear the snake handler yesterday. As rodent pest controllers, nothing it seems beats a snake.

Hoser convinced us to leave them alone on the farm from now on.

My kids were captivated by the 'hands on' handling of the blue tongue lizards and Cuddles the carpet python that happened between the venomous snake shows.

Actually, they wouldn't let us leave the snake show area, so we were there for three full hours.

The children then badgered me into buying a snakebusters video, which shattered many of the old myths about snakes.

After seeing video footage of tiger snakes gobbling up dog bones and lumps of meat and eating other strange things, it became obvious that snakes don't have to eat 'live food' like I'd been told as a youth.

Snakes mating? More myths shattered by the video.

Forget the trash on television, this video was the most informative one on reptiles I've ever seen.

The only drawback of all this is that now my kids want us to get reptiles as pets and I understand that by the time I get a licence, cages and the reptiles themselves, I may be up for a small fortune.

DURING the school holidays we managed to check out five different travelling reptile shows in Melbourne.

The two snakemen at the Royal Melbourne Show soured what was an otherwise excellent event.

Both snake handlers tormented snakes with metal sticks and the clearly agitated snakes struck back at their captors in obvious pain and distress.

As an animal lover, this suffering in the name of "entertainment" disappointed me.

There's no doubt that if snakes were furry animals, such cruelty to animals would never be allowed by the authorities.

One of the handlers, a blonde girl, obviously had no experience with the reptiles and was as agitated as the hapless snakes she tormented.

By contrast the reptile demonstrations at shopping malls were all excellent.

The three competing acts, Aussie Wildlife Display at Endeavour Hills Mall, Snakebusters at Waverley Gardens and Wild Action at Dandenong Plaza were professionally run and reptiles were treated with care and respect.

The stand out best of them all was Snakebusters.

world's deadliest snakes with care and respect.


Surely if other so-called snake handlers cannot match this basic level of care to their captives, then they shouldn't be in the business of wildlife displays.

#### Eastern Region Conference






#### Youth Leadership Forum
