It was one of Hoser's crazy ideas - however, if you fire a shotgun often enough, you will eventually hit something. The authors of the DNA study found that reticulatus and timoriensis were more closely related to Aussie pythons than to the genus Python sensu stricto. That meant that they had to be in a different genus, and Hoser's was the oldest available name for that genus. Hoser named a different genus for just about every single python species known to science, as always without a hint of evidence. However, because the names are in the system, any later evidence-based splitting of the old genus Python was almost guaranteed to force the unfortunate later authors to use one of his names - and Rawlings et al. had to swallow that pill. I gather they were less than chuffed at having to use "Broghammerus" as the genus name for the retic...

Stefan Broghammer, after whom the genus is named, is a German python breeder.

Unfortunately, there is no requirement for peer review for new genera, species etc. under ICZN Code regulations. If it's published in print in a manner that assures availability of the publication, that's all that's required. And the ICZN does not adjudicate on published descriptions - that's down to biological evidence, not rule-making. The Commission merely acts as an interpreter of the regulations of the Code where their interpretation is ambiguous, or would destabilise the nomenclature.

If the available evidence supports a new name, then it will become used by others, if it doesn't, then it will get forgotten. "Broghammerus" had remained unused because Hoser provided no evidence that justified recognising it as a new genus. Now Rawlings et al. have provided evidence that justify its recognition, so I guess it will become more widely used.
